### Writing a Novel in Reverse

Writers often divide themselves into two types: *plotters*, who plan everything, map out all the story beats, and imagine the characters before they start to actually write, and *pantsers*, who write by the seat of their pants and only try to apply a structure to their stories after they've gone on a journey of discovery. In reality, though, the difference is more of a spectrum than an opposition of two mutually exclusive categories.

I'm definitely more on the plotter end of the spectrum, but I'm still discovering things as I write. One problem that I often discover once I get into writing a story, is that my plans for it just aren't working. Or that my plan is like a map of a newly discovered land with elaborate detail at the starting point and destination, but nothing more than fuzzy blobs interrupting the blank terra incognita in-between.

Here be the writer's dragons.

In the novel I'm working on, my approach to this problem is to write it in reverse. I wrote the climax, then I thought about what needed to happen before that to move the story to the point at the beginning of the climactic scene, and I wrote *that* scene. Then I tinkered with the "map", then figured out what was needed before that, and wrote *that* scene.

I'm still more of a plotter than a pantser the plot isn't changing much as I work backward toward the beginning of the story. But I am discovering little by little who the main character is and what makes him tick. It's not autobiography, but there are bits and pieces of me in him.

And in case you need a hint about the sci-fi elements in the novel, they include: Earth 14,000 years in the future, a government that sentences political prisoners and heretics to decades-long cryogenic freezing, and an ecological catastrophe cascading from fungal networks in soil to the whole biosphere.

#### Other Tidbits

I'm alternating a between working on the novel and working on short stories—six to eight weeks on the novel, four to six weeks on short stories, then back again. Several short stories are with magazine and anthology editors right now, and I'm hoping for some news back from some of them soon.

The Story Works Round Table podcast invited me to be part of a panel of science fiction writers. We talked about the unique gift that science fiction offers, our favorite authors, and more.
